News from the Rector

Dear Friends,

T.S. Eliot said that April was the cruelest month, but evidently, he had never been to Cape Cod! March for us is the month which teases us with warming breezes and longer days, only to regress back into the cold blast of winter. This is what makes planning for Easter a little tricky this year—events we normally schedule for outdoors may require some quick rethinking!

Nevertheless, Holy Week at St. Mary's will be the liturgical high point of our year, beginning with Palm Sunday when we will gather in the Sturgis Library parking lot for our congregational palm procession into church, where we will

hear again the story of our Lord's Passion. Next, on Holy Tuesday, at 7 p.m., we will observe Tenebrae, meaning "shadows", as we join Jesus in his descent into his coming passion. On Maundy Thursday, we begin our Triduum observance with our celebration of the Last Supper, reenacting Jesus' foot washing, and stripping the altar in preparation for his death. That night we will observe Nightwatch, an overnight vigil for any who wish to come and pray in the church. On Good Friday, we will have three services: the Stations of the Cross at noon, our traditional Good Friday Liturgy at 3:00 p.m., and our ecumenical service at the First Lutheran Church in West Barnstable at 7:00

p.m. Our first celebration of the Resurrection will occur at the Great Vigil of Easter, Saturday, March 22nd, at 6:00 p.m. with the lighting of the Easter Fire, the singing of the Exsultet, and Baptism, followed by the Paschal Lamb Roast. On Easter Day we will have two Festival Eucharists with music from our choirs and guest performers at 9:00 and 11:00 a.m..

We look forward to your participation with us in these sacred events. As Lent comes to a close, and we anticipate celebrating the great mysteries of Christ's Passion and Resurrection, may God bless and keep you in constant stead.

Vestry News and Notes

At the February meeting, Matt Palmer's treasurer's report noted a significant shortfall in January and suggested we need to monitor pledge income. If the shortfall continues, expenses will also need to be curtailed. The Stewardship Committee reported they are working to contact the 40 or so members who have not yet pledged for 2008; they will also work to coordinate their efforts with Planned Giving. The Evangelism Committee is working on communications, greeters, hospitality, and signage as they seek to make St. Mary's a welcoming parish for all.

The main conversation centered on membership: What do we mean when we say someone is a member of St. Mary's? The consensus was that a member is a baptized Christian who worships regularly, is involved in the activities of the parish community and who contributes to the financial stability of the church. We recognize the challenges of having records on file for all of these persons, but seek to do so.

THE TRIDUUM

Celebrating the Paschal Mystery at Easter

The celebrations of Holy Week and the Triduum are the highpoint of our liturgical year because the events they celebrate—the passion, death and resurrection of Jesus—are at the very heart of our theology and ecclesiology. The liturgies we take part in during this time have their roots in the earliest years of Christianity. Our celebration of Holy Week begins just as it did in the fourth century, on Palm Sunday with a festival procession of palms and the reading of the Passion. The focal point of Holy Week, also as it was in ancient time, is the Triduum—the three days beginning at sundown on Maundy Thursday and extending through the first celebration of Easter at the Great Vigil.

Our celebration of the Triduum begins with our Maundy Thursday service where we will take part in the foot washing mandated by Jesus at the last supper., celebrate the Eucharist, strip the altar and depart in silence. After a night-long vigil, our observance resumes on Good Friday with the traditional somber liturgy which includes the reading of John’s passion narrative, a series of solemn collects and veneration of the cross.

Neither the Maundy Thursday nor Good Friday services ends with a dismissal because in reality they are not concluded until we celebrate the resurrection. This culmination of the liturgy and of our celebration comes at the Great Vigil of Easter. When we participate in this liturgy we participate in one of the oldest rites of the church. The Vigil begins in darkness with the lighting of the new fire, from which the Paschal candle is lit. In candle light we hear the singing of the ancient prayer known as the Exsultet and recall God’s mighty acts in the world in a series of readings from Hebrew scripture; we celebrate baptism and then with bells and music and cries of “alleluia” we joyfully greet the risen Christ and celebrate the first Eucharist of Easter.

The Great Vigil of Easter at Saint Mary’s begins with the lighting of the new fire at 6:00 pm. . If you have attended the Vigil before you know how stirring it is. And if you haven’t, consider joining us this year for dramatic and moving service.

Saint Mary’s Annual Lamb Roast begins at 8:00 pm, following the Easter Vigil. Please sign up for this celebratory feast in the sun room.

Bridge to Hope



Yet another program of the Council of Churches is a mentoring ministry for woman at the Barnstable County Correctional Facility. *Bridge to Hope* supports women while they are incarcerated and continues to provide support and companionship when they are released. The transition from incarceration back to "regular life" is one that is often fraught with stumbling blocks. Mentors assist these women as they work to build a new life, one centered on spirituality, and the incorporation of mental, emotional and economical life skills. The goal is to reduce recidivism by enabling women to make positive choices for themselves. The good news is that only 6 of 40 women participating in *Bridge to Hope* have returned to jail! This is a complete reversal of recidivism numbers since the establishment of *Bridge to Hope*. Annie Dillard for March

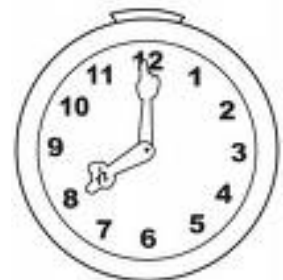

Our mission is to serve a hot meal while offering fellowship to members of our community.

Sustaining a viable world

ENVIRONMENTAL GUIDELINES FOR FACILITIES USE

The Environmental Stewardship has been hard at work to make Saint Mary's a 'greener' and more eco-conscious place. To make that a reality we need your help. Groups meeting at Saint Mary's should observe the following guidelines:

Food and Beverages:

- When serving coffee and tea, please use ceramic mugs, not paper products. (Disposable cups may be used for cold beverages).
- Please do not use individual bottles of drinking water. Pitchers for water are available in the kitchen.
- Please do not purchase Styrofoam products for any purpose.

Energy Use:

- Turn off lights after use--especially check to make sure that bathroom lights are turned off.
- Reset thermostats to evening setting (directions beside the thermostat)
- Turn off or set to energy saver any copiers and printers.

Paper Use:

- Write meeting agenda outlines on the write on/wipe off board in the meeting room instead of photocopying.
- Share documents by email when possible
- Use recycled paper products. If possible, copy on the backs of previously copied pages (*recycle box located beside the copier for this purpose*)

Recycling:

- Place recyclable items in labeled recycling stations.
 - Paper in crate in sunroom.
 - Plastic, metal, glass in gray container by back door in kitchen
 - Food compost in the white bucket on the kitchen counter by the trash receptacle (*meat and cheese products are not acceptable compost material.*)
 - Floral prep debris and old plant materials in indicated box in sanctuary
