There is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus. (Galatians 3:28)

In November, I had the privilege of taking our Youth Group to an event at West Parish that fostered a conversation about racism on Cape Cod. After watching a very moving video and listening to several responses from people of all ages and ethnicities, the question "what can we do" lingered in the room. My friend Angie Menke-Ballou, the pastor at Cotuit Federated Church, stood and noted that as a white person, one of the primary and most important steps that she can take is to learn how and where racism exists, and how she inadvertently benefits from racism. This willingness to see and talk about such an intense subject – that some people deny exists - and to look at our own beliefs about race, is extremely difficult and essential work.

As we seek to create an open and loving environment for honest reflection, The Rev. Dr. Kristen Harper, pastor at the Unitarian Church in Barnstable and I invite you to participate in a series of conversations about racism. To begin this series, we will gather in our parish hall to watch the documentary film *Traces of the Trade*, which documents a Bristol, RI family confronting their legacy as the largest slave-trading dynasty in U.S. history. We will then gather for two discussions of the book <u>Ten Hills Farm: The</u> Forgotten History of Slavery in the North.

Worship and Music

Chant: The "Map" of Liturgical Music

Episcopalians, like our Roman Catholic and Lutheran friends, utilize a lot of chant in their worship services...and there's good reason for that. Chant is really older than the Church itself, coming from the ancient Jews. Entire texts from the Torah were chanted, rather than merely read; this tradition continues today in their weekly Saturday morning services. King David (along with Asaph, Solomon, Moses, and a few others) wrote the Psalms fully expecting them to be sung (many have musical instructions). Indeed, to our forebears, saying the Psalms (rather than singing them) would have been as odd as contemporary guests at a birthday party reciting (rather than singing) the lyrics to "Happy Birthday to You!". The early Church continued this ancient tradition, frequently adapting very old and familiar tunes to support the new Christian worship (which was also based on Jewish practices).

Both the Western Church and Eastern Orthodox Church developed chant over many centuries, not only in churches but also in the monasteries where the daily cycle of eight worship offices provided near-constant singing of the Psalter. At the time of the Reformation, the English Church translated the Latin texts but continued to utilize the ancient melodies. On the Continent, Martin Luther also translated the texts into the vernacular, and frequently took the chant tunes and transformed them into hymns that a whole congregation could sing. We still sing these hymns regularly in church services today.

Chant has a unique ability to connect us with those who came before us, all the way to a time before Christianity. Chant is not merely a style; it's really more like a map that leads you back while you're traveling forward. Along our life journey, chant creates little mileposts that we revisit every so often, keeping us on a path, yet also keeping us connected with home. As we move forward through Epiphany and into Lent, allow the chants you'll hear and participate in...the *Sursum Corda* at the Eucharist, the Alleluia proper, the Ash Wednesday chants...to connect you with the people of the greater Church, and all humanity, from the past and in the present...and to the God who is our "home".

ECW Grants Awarded

The Episcopal Church Women (ECW) of St. Mary's holds three fund raising events each year including the Daffodil Tea, Rummage Sale, and Holly Fair. Many parishioners, both men and women contribute to the success of these efforts. The recent Holly Fair netted a record net profit in the vicinity of \$19,000 with receipts and expenses still being recorded. The ECW Steering Committee disburses funds from time to time to support St. Mary's as well as Cape Cod non-profit organizations that contribute and assist those with various needs. The Committee recently approved the following awards:

Nutrition Mission

Once a month (the 4th Monday of the month) St. Mary's pulls together approximately 12 -15 volunteers to shop, bake desserts at home, cook in our kitchen, transport hot food in casserole tins and serve this dinner at the Faith Assembly of God Church in Hyannis. This program began in April 2012 when the Calvary Baptist Church endured a fire that totaled the church and its soup kitchen. Many people who ate at Calvary Baptist 5 days a week suddenly had no place to get a good, hot meal. Shortly after the fire and working through the Council of Churches, a small group was formed to provide hot dinners 3 times a week at Faith Assembly. Following are some numbers that underscore the importance of this food program:

- Since April 2012 through December 2014 St. Mary's has served 30 times, totaling approximately 5100 meals.
- St Mary's was one of the original churches to step up to assist with these dinners.
- Currently 18 churches provide the 12 dinners each month.
- Number of meals served has grown from a start of 75 people to 225 people per dinner.
- Over the course of 33 months churches have served approximately 65,000 meals.

Thank you to the many volunteers at St Mary's who have donated so much of their time and skills to provide a hot meal to those in need.

Thanksgiving Drive

The Annual Thanksgiving Baskets for Cape Codders was a huge success. The numbers really tell the story. Community Action Committee (which is the "parent organization" for this program and with whom we partner) took care of 230 families, including some who were effected by the fire at Cromwell Court earlier in November. Of those 230 families, St. Mary's* and our community connections (*Centerville Civic Association, Cape Cod Baseball League) provided meals to 103 families; that is 45% of the families in need! This was sixth year St. Mary's partnered with CAC and this year we had 82 individuals and families participate from St. Mary's*. We did 66 baskets and collected \$1,980 in cash and supermarket gift cards. Converting the \$1,980 into actual "turkey baskets" we provided the Thanksgiving dinners for 103 families. Thank you to everyone who participated. You opened your hearts and wallets and spent time shopping...all to make this a special Thanksgiving for those who could least afford it. I am very proud of St. Mary's and our community connections to have such an impact on this program.

Let's Talk Money!

Sometimes in order for people to understand your story/message you first have to tell them something about your past so they can put what you are saying into the proper context.

I was one of six children raised by Norwegian parents Sometimes in order for people to understand your story/message you first have to tell them something about your past so they can put what you are saying into the proper context.

I was one of six children raised by Norwegian parents on a farm in the middle of Nebraska. God gave our family many gifts but money was not one of them. My mother listed our weekly "chores" and if we had completed them,

we put out our hands and were paid - five dimes each. She would then ask us to give back to her what we planned to contribute to our Lutheran Church on Sunday. We would then each give her a dime back and she would smile and tell us how happy God was to get our gift for those who have less than we do. Then we would drive 15 miles into town and spend our .40 cents on ice cream and candy. (This was the "olden days" when you could actually get ice cream and candy for .40



cents!) Lesson learned: you give to God/Church first then you spend what you have left.

My father died when I was 11 years old and our extended family, friends and church helped my mother raise all six of us. God clearly helped us every day. I earned a scholarship to the University of Nebraska and on my first Sunday away from home my room-mate asked me to go to church with her and thus began my life in the Episcopal Church. Upon graduation I took a job with IBM in Boston and joined the Church of the Advent. After working for IBM for ten years in 6 different cities, I left and started a Management Consulting firm in NYC commuting from Boston. After 25 years I sold the company and retired. During all this time I had gotten married, had a son, moved permanently to Yarmouth Port and become a member of St. Mary's. My son, Patrick, was confirmed and married at St. Mary's and my husband Ed's beautiful memorial service was held here 19 years ago. This is a very sacred place for me.

In my 35 years at St. Mary's I have been on nearly every committee ever imagined and I have to say I have enjoyed most of them. However, my time as Chair of the Stewardship Committee was my least favorite. I was shocked to learn that per family percentage of giving at St. Mary's was then and STILL IS one of the lowest in the entire Diocese. We certainly had a problem that I so wanted to address directly but I was told that "we Episcopalians cannot

> talk about money". Needless to say, this makes a Stewardship Campaign to raise money without talking about money rather difficult and probably not too successful. Finally I have been given the chance to say what I have wanted to say for so very long – so get prepared, I am going to talk about "money".

Every weekend we get up in our nice apartments/homes; dress in our nice clothes; and drive our nice cars & trucks to St. Mary's. Many of us take very nice vacations, have second homes, recreational vehicles and expensive hobbies, etc. but we don't make nice pledges. ON A VERY POSITIVE NOTE: Most of us are VERY CONNECTED to St. Mary's by giving VERY GENEROUSLY of our time and talents. However, somehow

we just seem to DISCONNECT when it comes to our money and our pledges. It has been a problem for years and still is a problem. I believe it is time that we talk about staying CONNECTED to St. Mary's even when it comes to our money.

I was once challenged by my Financial Advisor to keep a list every week of my discretionary/impulse purchases. It was amazing how a few coffees, bottled waters; snacks, lunches, (not to mention to this cute orange jacket ON SALE!) can easily add up to \$10.00, \$20.00, \$30.00 or much more a week! If I have money enough to spend it on these

discretionary things, why can't I just add at least \$10.00 or more to my weekly pledge? I figured out that if all of the 2014 weekly pledges at St. Mary's were increased BY JUST \$10.00 A WEEK, we could add over \$200,000 income to our 2015 budget! Just imagine the possibilities and impact \$200,000+ could have on St. Mary's and the lives of so many in need in our community, given by those of us here to whom God has given so very much!

This year's pledge card is excellent – clearly pointing out the percentages at different income levels and the amount to pledge per week. As a friend at St. Mary's told me in amazement a few weeks ago: "This Pledge Card is great! - I had no idea I was pledging such a small percentage of my money to St. Mary's!"

When I heard that I realized that here is the DISCONNECT I have been trying to figure out for years – Parishioners seem to be just picking a dollar number that seems right without connecting it to their total income in any way. If everyone would just do the math starting at 10% and then backing down if necessary, I am confident St. Mary's can get out of the bottom in church giving in our Diocese.

Remembering the lessons my mother taught me so long ago - I have always pledged by tithing at least 10% and I plan to do that again in 2015. Even on a fixed retirement income it is not hard to figure out what 10% a week comes to.

Determining your pledge for 2015 is a very important and very personal decision and it takes time and prayer to complete. What works for one does not work for all. Ultimately it is just between you and me and our God.

In closing - my Mom died on the Cape two years ago at 101 years old.

She read the Bible every single day of her adult life up to her death. If she were here today, I know exactly what she would say to all of us: "Thank you for your generous pledge. I KNOW YOU HAVE MADE GOD HAPPY."

Creation Care News



There are two things we would like to share with you: changes at the Barnstable Transfer station and a reminder about the plastics that infiltrate our waterways and affect the food chain and thus end up affecting us.

First: here are the changes to the Barnstable Transfer station-

recycling is still FREE for all residents:

Barnstable Transfer Station

As of January 1st, 2015 the Barnstable Transfer Station started single stream recycling. Glass, paper, tin cans, and plastic can be placed in one container and disposed of in the same compactors in the recycle area. This <u>excludes</u> CORRUGATED CARDBOARD; it must be separated and disposed of in separate compactors located at each end of the recycle area.

Residents who use the Barnstable Transfer Station for the purpose of recycling will be required to have a Recycle sticker affixed to their front windshield. The **sticker is free of charge to residents and residential property owners**.

Some recycle material disposal fees still apply. The sticker for the disposal of household waste with recycling will remain available for purchase as in the past. All facility rules and regulations apply to both stickers and are available at the Transfer Station office or through the mail.

Finally, here is a picture of plastics on a shore line

showing a few of the 5.25 trillion pieces of plastic floating around in the world's oceans, according to a new report. These washed up recently on a beach in the Azores. Scientists say that PCBs and other dangerous chemicals



attach to the plastics, then as the pieces break up into smaller shreds, eaten by fish, where eventually the chemicals find their way into the human food supply.
