The Joy and Challenge of Forgiveness

The change in our worship schedule has created a regular “adult forum” time on Sunday mornings, and I deeply appreciate the chance to teach on a regular basis. The first topic of our forums was forgiveness, one of the most complicated, difficult, and ultimately fruitful callings of our Christian lives. In our wide-ranging conversations, we barely scratched the surface of the psychological, Scriptural, theological, and sacramental bases for forgiveness. For those of you unable to attend, I drew many of my comments from the following three books, which I commend to anyone wanting to reflect on forgiveness.

- Beyond Revenge: The Evolution of the Forgiveness Instinct by Michael McCullough
- Reconciliation: The Ubuntu Theology of Desmond Tutu by Michael Battle
- Reconciliation: Preparing for Confession in the Episcopal Church by Martin Smith

Since finishing this series of conversations, I’ve been reading Desmond and Mpho Tutu’s The Book of Forgiving and find their insights incredibly helpful. Particularly, the authors articulate a fourfold path toward forgiveness that helps us to break free from the “revenge” cycle. While many of us may not actively seek revenge, we can become trapped in mental cycles of revenge or re-playing the wound. When we are caught in the revenge cycle, we repeatedly experience the hurt, harm, loss, and related pain. When we can even begin to contemplate the idea of forgiveness, we turn toward a different experience, one of healing.

In contrast to the revenge cycle, the forgiveness cycle seeks to reconnect with the person who harmed us rather than retaliating (again, this may be “only” mental retaliation). The fourfold forgiveness path invites us to (1) tell the story, (2) name the hurt, (3) grant forgiveness, and (4) renew or release the relationship. This marvelous book explores each step with sensitivity and acknowledges that when we have been deeply hurt, we may embark on the fourfold path with a therapist, priest or trusted friend instead of the person who harmed us. With this “safe” person, we can tell the story, name the hurt, and grant forgiveness as we seek to release a potentially damaging relationship and experience the healing power

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of forgiveness. In other instances, with God's grace, we find the strength to walk this path with the other person if s/he is willing to acknowledge the harm caused and be forgiven. When we have harmed another person, this book offers us a pathway for asking for forgiveness and thus embarking on the journey of self-forgiveness. If you would like to talk about forgiveness or share your story, please be in touch. God loves each of us deeply, and through Jesus, sends the healing grace of forgiveness into our lives. It would be my honor to walk this path with you.

Clergy Discretionary Accounts

I am deeply grateful for the many gifts that I receive to my discretionary account throughout each year. The canons of the church provide for accounts that offer priests access to funds for "charitable uses" that arise outside of the church budget. In the words of my previous bishop, the Right Rev. Peter Lee, discretionary accounts offer priests a chance to extend their ministry in the world. In the course of any given year, my discretionary account may be used to fund the following kinds of expenses:

- Purchasing grocery cards for the office to give out to people in need
- Helping with part of a utility bill before someone's power / phone / heat is terminated
- Purchasing small gifts to thank our staff members at Christmas
- Contributing to local charities like Duffy Health Center
- Contributing to fund-raising initiatives like Bob Murray Housing with Love

While this is not an exhaustive list, I hope it gives you a sense of how I "extend my ministry in the world." The discretionary accounts are funded through the pledge envelope "special offerings" and donations made in gratitude for our participation in funerals and baptisms. As we move into summertime here at St. Mary's, I have been reflecting about resurrected life. In Jesus Christ, we are all intimately called to live into resurrected life every day – to live into a way of being and relating that is marked by reconciliation and re-creation – and I have been meditating on how we as a church can do this.

What will this look like? How can we both reconcile, or repair what is broken, and also re-create, or start afresh? One way of answering these questions is to look at our outreach initiatives here at St. Mary's. For example, our new ministry, Food 4 Kids, is growing out of the realization that too many children here on the Cape are going hungry, especially in the summer. Food insecurity amongst children is one of the saddest, if not outright sinful, realities of a nation as wealthy as our own. In fostering this ministry, St. Mary's hopes to bring some measure of nourishment and hope to those previously

overlooked and forgotten – to repair the brokenness in our community. But we are also blazing a new path and building new relationships. Through this ministry, St. Mary's hopes in future years to be able coordinate larger efforts amongst many churches and organizations to address this need. We want to connect people and combine our efforts in ways that have not previously been established – to create a new vision of God's love at work in the mid-Cape.

This summer, I invite you to reflect on what resurrected life will look like for you. We have heard from many voices in our adult forums this season, all speaking to various ways that we can become better engaged with our community. Which outreach ministry speaks to you? How will you repair and reconcile what is broken, and how will you step into the new creation into which God is calling you?


JOY MASS on 4th Sundays at 9:00 am in the Parish Hall

FOOD FOR KIDS (F4K):



Two thousand years ago Jesus showed His loving compassion for those in need when he instructed his disciples, "Feed My Lambs." That admonition is no less meaningful today here on Cape Cod than it was then. You may be shocked to learn that more than 10,000 children on Cape Cod come from families that live below the poverty level and are classified as food insecure - in other words they are hungry because they don't always get enough nutritious food to eat. That is especially true in the summer months when children cannot access free or reduced-price school meals. That is the bad news.

The good news is that, as part of a nationwide, federally funded program, St. Mary's Outreach is about to become a sponsor of a Summer Food

Service Program called Food 4 Kids. The program is run by the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture and the MA Dept. of Elementary and Secondary Education and Project Bread in Boston. As a sponsor, we will prepare nutritious meals for approximately 75-100 children and deliver them to three designated meal sites in Barnstable, from Monday through Thursday, July 5 to August, when they do not have access to free food at school. Brown bag breakfasts and lunches will be assembled early in the mornings at St. Mary's and then delivered to the sites.

This is where you, our St. Mary's parishioners, are needed if you can help. There will be numerous opportunities for all of us to volunteer - from the very young to octogenarians and older - everything from making sandwiches, bagging and packing meals, filling coolers and delivering the food to hungry children. More information will follow but whether you can help a lot or just a little, please think about volunteering a bit of your time. Your participation can help make this mission a success as well as make a difference in a child's life.

ALL OUR CHILDREN (AOC): One of our four major outreach initiatives for this year is to develop a church-school

partnership through All Our Children. All Our Children is a national network that promotes faith-rooted community partnerships with public schools to help all children reach their full potential by supporting their right to quality public education. Over half of the 50 million school-age children in the US live in poverty, and most of these attend public schools without the resources to close that opportunity gap.

St. Mary's is blessed to have among its parishioners Lallie Lloyd, the Director of All Our Children. Lallie, with fellow parishioner Julie Lytle (Executive Director of Province 1) and a planning team that includes Eleanor Braun, Allison Bresette and Lisa Barr, developed the first of six regional forums to help congregations begin or advance their journeys into partnership. This conference was held in February, 2016, at the Barbara Harris Camp and Conference Center.

Now it's time to bring what they learned to the St. Mary's community. We are looking for people who are also called to this ministry and who are willing

and able to commit time to helping it grow. *Our first step will be a forum on Sunday, May 1, at 10:00 to introduce the possibilities of a church-school partnership.* Next steps will include researching local demographics and educating ourselves through directed readings and speakers as we determine which local, under-resourced school best matches our team's gifts. We will then develop a relationship with a local school, and decide together if there is mutual interest in exploring a partnership and the form it will take.

If you believe that God calls us to advocate for quality public education for all, and you want to build a deeper connection between St. Mary's and our neighbors, please join us as we launch this exciting new initiative.

During times of a health crisis there are many details to absorb and many people to keep informed. Instead of making many phone calls with every update, consider using a website that has been created to post updates and other information as well as offering a place where others can post their feelings and offers to help.

Several parishioners have used a free health journal website when they have been in the midst of a medical or other crisis. The website is a personal health journal, rallying friends and family during any type of health journey. The site also offers planners, where a calendar of needed services can be created, such as rides or meals.

The following information is about the site, CaringBridge, though there are others. We are not endorsing this site but are offering it to those of you who may need it in the future. Currently Liz Mumford has a CaringBridge site. If you join CaringBridge you can search for her page: lizmumford.

The Benefits of CaringBridge

CaringBridge transforms your personal connections into support when you need it most. By creating a free CaringBridge website, people in a time of need can share updates, photos, and videos, connecting with friends who care and want to help. This is a private site.

Keep everyone up-to-date with journal entries, by either you or significant other, where you can easily share the latest with people who care and support you.

Feel the difference a community can make. Family and friends can provide messages of love and hope through a CaringBridge network.

Coordinate everyday help. Your Planner helps coordinate and schedule tasks such as delivering meals, providing childcare and arranging transportation.

Have you ever had breast cancer? Liz wants to talk to you...



Liz Mumford, member of the St. Mary's choir, was diagnosed with metastatic breast cancer in March. Liz had spinal fusion surgery in March and is now home recovering from the

surgery and undergoing radiation for the tumors in her body. She is extremely positive and an inspiration to everyone who talks with her or visits her. She does not want any pity but she is determined to tell her story to as many people as possible so others can become their own health advocates and push to get the answers they need.

Twelve years ago Liz had what she calls "a little tiny breast cancer." It was successfully treated and no evidence of disease had been noted since. After 5 years she was told that it was gone; same thing at 10 years. She had her yearly mammograms and even had a few X-rays when her back, neck and hip started to bother her. "The problem was, with the mammograms and any other exam, they were concentrating on the breast area, and when I started to have pain in my back and neck, and then my hip, nobody thought to look for a tumor, except one." Her friend, Dr. Pat Donohoe, former head of Pediatric Surgery at Mass. General said, "Watch out for tumors...." Last fall the pain in her hip was so bad she was told to get an MRI. That's when the tumors were found all through her spine and in many other places.

Liz was the only human who may have thought she had cancer again, but Lucy, her beloved Labrador,

knew it as long ago as last summer. Lucy always enjoyed walking around Liz's Hyannis Port home, but last summer every time another dog would even approach Liz, Lucy went on the attack. No dog could get near Liz. This seemed very strange because when her son Sam took Lucy for a walk nothing happened. Liz acquired a muzzle for Lucy and steered clear of other dogs when they went on their walks. "Some people say that dogs can smell cancer and I truly believe it after this experience," says Liz. Maybe Lucy couldn't tell her what was wrong but she certainly tried to protect Liz as she knew there was something wrong with her owner and friend.

Liz says "If you have ever had breast cancer, no matter how many years ago it was, and you have been doing fine for years...if you start to have unexplainable pain in your joints or bones or wherever, get an MRI. I paid only \$150 and it was well worth it. Don't let people dismiss your concerns or ignore the pain because it is not in the breast area. Breast cancer recurrence can get into your bones and cannot be picked up by an X-ray. You need to get an MRI. If you get any pain, think cancer first. Be your own advocate as only you can be."

Our prayers are with Liz as she goes through her treatments. We are so grateful that she is a part of our parish community and an important role model for all of us, in many different ways.
